Barking up the wrong hut

THE 2008-2009 archaeological dig on Camden Park has unearthed useful evidence of early buildings first seen on an 1840s map but in my opinion none of these buildings relates in any way to the bark but shown in the Conrad Martens painting circa 1835.

The best reference we have to Elizabeth Macarthur's bark but is that painting.

Sadly, it appears to have been dismissed as too romantic or indulging in artist's licence.

On the contrary, Martens was noted for his accuracy in landscape and architectural detail.

The "small miserable hut" (or bark hut) is depicted low on an eastern slope, well settled into the slope and viewed from a higher level.

The archaeological site being excavated is on the western side of the same ridge, whence the background hills to the east have been well identified but the foreground has not.

Had the hut been in this position, it could be viewed only from a lower level.

The Belgenny ridge where all this takes place is a long finger of hard, dry land above flood level. Clearly evident on the map, the western boundary of John Macarthur's first grant Lower Camden (1805) courses

the ridge from north to south. Though effort has been made to re-establish the boundary, I believe we may safely presume the old bark hut lay on the eastern side (on the early grant), while the newly-discovered remains on the western side are more likely to be part of a later development on an 1818 grant known as West Camden.
